TYPE OF WORK

Department of Justice staff conduct their responsibilities within a variety of subcomponents, that is entities, within the department. These include:



Investigative components such as the Federal Bureau of Investigation and Drug Enforcement Administration, which prevent and deter crime and arrest criminal suspects



Litigating divisions such as the U.S. attorney's offices, which prosecute offenders and represent the U.S. government in court




Regional initiatives such as those carried out by the Office of Community Oriented Policing Services and the Office of Justice Programs, which provide assistance to state, tribal and local governments

THE JUSTICE DEPARTMENT IN YOUR BACKYARD

Project Safe Neighborhoods is a nationwide initiative that brings together federal, state, local and tribal law enforcement officials as well as prosecutors, community leaders and other stakeholders, to identify the most pressing violent crime problems in a community and develop comprehensive solutions to address them. The project is coordinated by the department's U.S. attorneys' offices in the 94 federal judicial districts throughout the 50 states, the District of Columbia and the U.S. territories.

Justice employees <u>Joshua Mellor</u>, Nicholas Cheviron, Stephanie Stevens and members of Operation Trojan Shield were nominated for a 2023 Service to America medal for their outstanding work. They conceived and led a unique worldwide investigation using information from a government-controlled encrypted messaging service that resulted in the arrest of more than a thousand drug traffickers and members of organized crime syndicates.
